As good as it gets? ... or can we do better?


More medication errors are being reported in PRHI partner hospitals, and that's a good thing. When it comes to learning and improving, the only good error is a reported error.

The Institute of Medicine estimates that medication errors occur in about 5% of all orders. And yet the chart below shows that, during the second quarter of

The hospitals with more aggressive reporting rates are beginning to realize dividends. Increased reporting has led to increased problem-solving.

2002, PRHI partner hospitals reported an average error rate of just .034%.

The best voluntary reporting system won't capture every error. But is .034% as good as it gets?

A few hospitals are reporting much more aggressively than the rest. What sets them apart?

- ✓ Their leaders personally, regularly communicate with employees the expectation that errors will be reported in a non-punitive environment.
- ✓ Their error reporting systems are simple to use.
- Error reports result in *feedback* and *action*—not blame.
